THE OPENING RITE

Inside the entrance door of the church, the celebrant of the liturgy conducts a Rite of Reception of the body. This rite includes greeting those who have gathered together for the liturgy, blessing the body with holy water, and placing the pall on the casket.

After the priest completes this ritual, the congregation follows behind the casket in procession to the front of the church where the funeral director will seat them.

The casket is placed in front of the Paschal Candle, the celebrant may place the Book of the Gospels on the casket as a reminder of the Christian dignity of the deceased person.

Aspects of the Rite

- 1. Sprinkling the body with holy water and placing the pall on the casket are reminders of the dignity conferred on all of us by Baptism. Family members or others may place the pall over the casket as a way of participating in this ritual.
- 2. The opening hymn, sung together as the congregation processes to the front of the church, sets a tone for us to remember the person who has died and to have hope in eternal rest. (Those planning the funeral liturgy may request appropriate hymns for any part of the liturgy.)
- 3. The Paschal Candle is a symbol of Christ, our Light and the Light of the World, the Light which ahs overcome death.
- 4. Placing the book of Gospels on the casket is a reminder of the Word of God which forms our lives as Christians, and it serves to remind us of God's promise of everlasting life to those who believe in His word. Other appropriate Christian symbols may also be placed on the casket. (rosary, prayer book, etc...)

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

During the Liturgy of the Word, there are three readings from the scriptures: the first from the Old Testament, the second from an Epistle of the New Testament; and the third from a Gospel of one of the Evangelists.

After the reading from the Old Testament, the cantor will sing a Responsorial Psalm, and the congregation will join in the response.

Before the reading of the Gospel, the cantor and congregation sing an acclamation of praise.

Each of the readings and psalmodies encourages us with words of comfort and hope.

After the celebrant has read the Gospel, he will give a homily. The Liturgy of the Word concludes with the reading of the General Intercessions.

Aspects of the Rite

- Scriptural readings may be selected from the list which follows this introduction. Those planning the liturgy may also choose to have someone read the passages from the Old Testament, from the Epistle, and they may also read the General Intercessions.
- 2. The homily, which the priest or deacon gives, is an explanation and reminder of the Christian mysteries we celebrate and hear in the scriptural readings. A eulogy or words of remembrance are meant to be spoken after communion. The homily is specifically meant to remind all of us of the reality of Christian Hope as we face the reality of physical death.
- 3. The General Intercessions are petitions in which the congregation asks God to respond to our needs. If they so choose, the family may write their own petitions expressing their own personal needs.

THE LITURGY OF THE EUCHARIST

In preparation for the Eucharist celebration, the celebrant prepares the altar. During this time of preparation, members of the family may go to the credence table where there will be bread and wine, and bring these gifts to the priest. At the same time, the organist and cantor will sing a hymn, and the priest will incense the altar and the gifts of bread and wine.

Aspects of the Rite

- 1. Bread and wine are fruits of this earth, which we offer to God, that in return for our offering, He will make of them a heavenly gift to us, the Body and Blood of His Son.
- 2. The hymn of preparation reminds us to look forward to the mysteries which we are about to celebrate.
- 3. As the priest incenses the altar and the gifts of bread and wine, we think of the rising incense as a symbol of offering our gifts and lives to God and of the holiness of our body in which we live out this life.

THE FINAL COMMENDATION

Before the final prayers for the deceased, a member of the family or a friend may give a Eulogy or remarks of Remembrance to honor the memory and the life of the person who has died. After the remarks, the Funeral Liturgy concludes as the celebrant offers prayers for the deceased and for those who mourn, then the body of the deceased person is incensed. As the funeral procession leaves the church, the congregation sings a final hymn.

Aspects of the Rite

- 1. The Eulogy or Remarks of Remembrance is an opportunity for a family member (or friend) to briefly speak in memory of the deceased. This is a wonderful opportunity to publicly remember and thank this person we honor with Christian burial.
- 2. During the Song of Farewell, the priests incenses the casket as a gesture of honor and respect.
- 3. As we bid a final farewell to the person who has died, the Prayer of Commendation commends the person to the care of God and offers us comfort as we let him/her go.
- 4. The Final Hymn reminds us of all our family and friends who have gone before us and comforts us during our time of loss.

A reading from the Book of Lamentations:

NEW TESTAMENT SELECTIONS

1B Acts 10: 34-43

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles:

Peter proceeded to speak, saying:
"In truth, I see that God shows no partiality.
Rather, in every nation whoever fears him
and acts uprightly
is acceptable to him.

You know the word that he sent to the children

of Israel

as he proclaimed peace through Jesus Christ,

who is Lord of all,

what has happened all over Judea,

beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached,

how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth

with the Holy Spirit and power.

He went about doing good

and healing all those oppressed by the Devil,

for God was with him.

We are witnesses of all that he did

both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem.

They put him to death by hanging him on a tree.

This man God raised on the third day

and granted that he be visible,

not to all the people, but to us,

the witnesses chosen by God in advance,

who ate and drank with him after he arose from the dead.

He commissioned us to preach to the people

and testify that he is the one appointed by God

as judge of the living and the dead.

To him all the prophets bear witness,

that everyone who believes in him

will receive forgiveness of sins through

his name.

2B Romans 6: 3-9

A reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans:

Brothers and sisters:

Are you unaware that we who are baptized into

Christ Jesus

were baptized into his death?

We were indeed buried with him through

baptism into death,

so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead

by the glory of the Father

we too might live in newness of life.

For if we have grown into union with him

through a death like his,

we shall also be united with him in the resurrection.

We know that our old self was crucified with him,

so that our sinful body might be done away with,

that we might no longer be in slavery to sin.

For a dead person has been absolved from sin.

If, then, we have died with Christ,

we believe that we shall also live with him.

We know that Christ, raised from the dead,

dies no more;

death no longer has power over him.

3B Romans 5: 5-11

A reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans:

Brothers and sisters:

Hope does not disappoint,

because the love of God has been poured out

into our hearts

through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us.

For Christ, while we were still helpless,

died at the appointed time for the ungodly.

Indeed, only with difficulty does one die for

a just person,

though perhaps for a good person

one might even find courage to die.

But God proves his love for us

in that while we were still sinners

Christ died for us.

How much more then, since we are now justified

by his Blood,

will we be saved through him from the wrath.

Indeed, if, while we were enemies,

we were reconciled to God through the death

of his Son,

how much more, once reconciled,

will we be saved by his life.

Not only that,

but we also boast of God through our Lord

Iesus Christ,

through whom we have now received

reconciliation.

4B Romans 5: 17-21

A reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans:

Brothers and Sisters:

If, by the transgression of the one,

death came to reign through that one, how much more will those who receive the

abundance of grace

and the gift of justification

come to reign in life through the one

Jesus Christ.

In conclusion, just as through one transgression

condemnation came upon all,

so, through one righteous act,

acquittal and life came to all.

For just as through the disobedience

of the one man

the many were made sinners,

so through the obedience of the one

the many will be made righteous.

The law entered in so that transgression

might increase

but, where sin increased, grace overflowed all

the more, so that,

as sin reigned in death,

grace might also reign through justification

for eternal life

through Jesus Christ our Lord.

5B Romans 8: 14-23

A Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans:

Brothers and Sisters:

Those who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God.

For you did not receive a spirit of slavery

to fall back into fear;

but you received a spirit of adoption, through which we cry, "Abba, Father!"

The Spirit itself bears witness with our spirit

that we are children of God, and if children, then heirs,

heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ,

if only we suffer with him

so that we may also be glorified with him.

I consider that the sufferings of this present time are as nothing

compared with the glory to be revealed for us.

For creation awaits with eager expectation

the revelation of the children of God; for creation was made subject to futility, not of its own accord but because of the one who subjected it,

in hope that creation itself
would be set free from slavery to o

would be set free from slavery to corruption and share in the glorious freedom of the children of God.

We know that all creation is groaning in labor pains even until now; and not only that, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, we also groan within ourselves, as we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies.

6B Romans 8: 31-35, 37-39

A Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans:

Brothers and Sisters: If God is for us, who ca

If God is for us, who can be against us?

He did not spare his own Son

but handed him over for us all, will he not also give us everything else

along with him?

Who will bring a charge against God's

chosen ones?

It is God who acquits us.

Who will condemn?

It is Christ Jesus who died, rather, was raised,

who also is at the right hand of God,

who indeed intercedes for us.

What will separate us from the love of Christ?

Will anguish, or distress or persecution, or famine,

or nakedness, or peril, or the sword?

No, in all these things,

we conquer overwhelmingly

through him who loved us.

For I am convinced that neither death, nor life,

nor angels, nor principalities,

nor present things, nor future things,

nor powers, nor height, nor depth,

nor any other creature

will be able to separate us

from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

7B Romans 14: 7-12

A Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans:

Brothers and Sisters:

No one lives for oneself,

and no one dies for oneself.

For if we live, we live for the Lord,

and if we die, we die for the Lord;

so then, whether we live or die,

we are the Lord's.

For this is why Christ died and came to life,

that he might be Lord of both the dead

and the living.

Why then do you judge your brother?

Or you, why do you look down on your brother?

For we shall all stand before the judgement seat

of God;

For it is written:

As I live, says the Lord, every knee

shall bend before me,

and every tongue shall give praise to God.

So then each of us shall give an accounting of

himself to God.

8B 1 <u>Corinthians 13: 4-8</u>

A reading from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians:

Love is patient, love is kind.

It is not jealous, it is not pompous,

it is not inflated, it is not rude,

it does not seek its own interests,

it is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury,

it does not rejoice over wrongdoing

but rejoices with the truth.

It bears all things, believes all things,

hopes all things, endures all things.f

Love never fails.

9B 1 Corinthians 15: 51-57

A reading from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians:

Brothers and Sisters:

Behold, I tell you a mystery.

We shall not all fall asleep, but we will all

be changed,

in an instant, in the blink of an eye,

at the last trumpet.

For the trumpet will sound,

the dead will be raised incorruptible,

and we shall be changed.

For that which is corruptible must clothe itself

with incorruptibility,

and that which is mortal must clothe itself

with immortality.

And when this which is corruptible clothes itself

with incorruptibility

and this which is mortal clothes itself with

immortality,

then the word that is written shall come about:

Death is swallowed up in victory.

Where, O death, is your victory?

Where, O death, is your sting?

The sting of death is sin,

and the power of sin is the law.

But thanks be to God who gives us the victory

through our Lord Jesus Christ.

10B <u>Revelation 21: 1-5a, 6b-7</u>

A reading from the Book of Revelation:

I, John, saw a new heaven and a new earth.
The former heaven and the former earth had passed away,
And the sea was no more.
I also saw the holy city, a new Jerusalem,
Come down out of heaven from God,
Prepared as a bride adorned for her husband.
I head a loud voice from the throne saying,
"Behold, God's dwelling is with the human race.

although we know that while we are at home in the body

we are away from the Lord,

for we walk by faith, not by sight.

Yet we are courageous

Therefore, we aspire to please him,

whether we are at home or away.

For we must all appear before the judgement seat

of Christ.

so that each may receive recompense,

according to what he did in the body,

that one died for all; therefore all have died.

He indeed died for all,

so that those who live might no longer live

for themselves

but for him who for their sake died and was raised.

Consequently, from now on we regard

no one according to the flesh;

even if we once knew Christ according to the flesh,

yet now we know him so no longer.

13B <u>1 Thessalonians 4: 13-18</u>

A reading from Paul's First Letter to the Thessalonians:

We do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, about those who have fallen asleep, so that you may not grieve like the rest, who have no hope.

For if we believe that Jesus died and rose, so too will God, through Jesus, bring with him those who have fallen asleep.

Indeed, we tell you this, on the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will surely not precede those who have fallen asleep.

For the Lord himself, with a word of command, with the voice of an archangel and with the trumpet of God, will come down from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first.

Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air.

5C <u>Matthew 25: 31-46</u>

Jesus said to his disciples:

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory,

and all the angels with him,

he will sit upon his glorious throne,

and all the nations will be assembled before him.

And he will separate them one from another,

as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats.

He will place the sheep on his right and the goats on his left.

Then the king will say to those on his right,

'Come, you who are blessed by my Father.

Inherit the kingdom prepared for you

from the foundation of the world.

For I was hungry and you gave me food,

I was thirsty and you gave me drink,

a stranger and you welcomed me,

naked and you clothed me,

ill and you cared for me,

in prison and you visited me.'

Then the righteous will answer him and say,

'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you,

or thirsty and give you drink?

When did we see you a stranger and welcome you,

or naked and clothe you?

When did we see you ill or in prison, and visit you?'

'Amen, I say to you, whatever you did

for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me.'

Then he will say to those on his left,

'Depart from me, you accursed,

into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels.

For I was hungry and you gave me no food,

I was thirsty and you gave me no drink,

a stranger and you gave me no welcome,

naked and you gave me no clothing,

ill and in prison and you did not care for me.

Then they will answer and say,

Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty

or a stranger or naked or ill or in prison,

and not minister to your need?

He will answer them, "Amen, I say to you,

what you did not do for one of these least ones,

you did not do for me.

And these will go off to eternal punishment,

but the righteous to eternal life."

6C Mark 15:33-39

At noon darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon.

And at three o'clock Jesus cried out in a loud voice,

"Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?"

which is translated,

"My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

Some of the bystanders who heard it said,

"Look, he is calling Elijah."

One of them ran, soaked a sponge with wine,

put it on a reed,

and gave it to him to drink, saying,

"Wait, let us see if Elijah comes to take him down."

Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last.

The veil of the sanctuary was torn in two

from top to bottom.

When the centurion who stood facing him

saw how he breathed his last he said,

"Truly this man was the Son of God!"

7C Luke 1: 67-74

Zechariah his father, filled with the Holy Spirit,

prophesied, saying:

"Blessed be the Lord, the God of Israel,

for he has come to his people and set them free.

He has raised up for us a mighty Savior,

born of the house of his servant David.

Through his prophets he promised of old

that he would save us from our enemies,

from the hands of all who hate us.

He promised to show mercy to our fathers

and to remember his holy covenant.

This was the oath he swore to our father Abraham:

to set us free from the hand of our enemies, free to worship him without fear,

holy and righteous in his sight

all the days of our life."

8C <u>Luke 7: 11-17</u>

Jesus journeyed to a city called Nain,

and his disciples and a large crowd accompanied him.

As he drew near to the gate of the city,

a man who had died was being carried out,

the only son of his mother, and she was a widow.

A large crowd from the city was with her.

When the Lord saw her,

he was moved with pity for her and said to her,

"Do not weep."

He stepped forward and touched the coffin;

at this the bearers halted,

and he said "Young man, I tell you, arise!"

The dead man sat up and began to speak,

and Jesus gave him to his mother.

Fear seized them all, and they glorified God, exclaiming,

"A great prophet has arisen in our midst,"

and God has visited his people."

This report about him spread through the whole

Of Judea and in all the surrounding region.

9C <u>Luke 12: 35-40</u>

Jesus said to his disciples:

"Gird your loins and light your lamps

and be like servants who await

their master's return from a wedding,

ready to open immediately when he comes

and knocks.

Blessed are those servants whom the master

finds vigilant on his arrival.

Amen, I say to you, he will gird himself,

have them recline at table, and proceed

to wait on them.

And should he come in the second or third watch

and find them prepared in this way,

blessed are those servants.

Be sure of this:

if the master of the house had known the hour

when the thief

was coming,

he would not have let his house be broken into.

You also must be prepared, for at an hour

you do not expect,

the Son of Man will come."

10C <u>Luke 23:33, 39-43</u>

When the soldiers came to the place called the Skull, they crucified him and the criminals there, one on his right, the other on his left.

Now one of the criminals hanging there reviled Jesus, saying, "Are you not the Christ? save yourself and us."

The other man, however, rebuking him, said in reply, "Have you no fear of God,

for you are subject to the same condemnation?

And indeed, we have been condemned justly, for the sentence we received corresponds to our crimes,

but this man has done nothing criminal."

Then he said,

"Jesus, remember me when you come into your Kingdom."

He replied to him,

"Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."

11C Luke 23: 44-49

It was now about noon and darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon Because of an eclipse of the sun.

Then the veil of the temple was torn down the middle.

Jesus cried out in a loud voice,

"Father, into your hands I commend my spirit;" and when he had said this he breathed his last.

The centurion who witnessed what had happened glorified God and said, "This man was innocent beyond doubt."

When all the people who had gathered saw what had happened, they returned home beating their breasts; but all his acquaintances stood at a distance, including the women who had followed him from Galilee and saw these events.

12C Luke 24: 13-35

Two of the disciples of Jesus were going

to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Ierusalem.

and they were conversing about all the things that had occurred.

And it happened that while they were

conversing and debating,

Jesus himself drew near and walked with them,

but their eyes were prevented from

recognizing him.

He asked them,

"What are you discussing as you walk along?"

They stopped, looking downcast.

One of them, named Cleopas, said to him in reply,

"Are you the only visitor the Jerusalem

who does not know of the things

that have taken place there in these days?"

And he replied to them "What sort of things?"

They said to him,

"The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene,

who was a prophet mighty in deed and word

before God and all the people,

how our chief priests and rulers both

handed him over

to a sentence of death and crucified him.

But we were hoping that he would be the one

to redeem Israel;

and besides all this.

it is now the third day since this took place.

Some women from our group, however,

have astounded us:

they were at the tomb early in the morning

and did not find his Body;

they came back and reported

that they had indeed seen a vision of angels

who announced that he was alive.

Then some of those with us went to the tomb

and found things just as the women had described,

but him they did not see.

And he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are!

How slow of heart to believe all that the

prophets spoke!

Was it not necessary that the Christ would suffer

these things

and enter into his glory?"

Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets,

he interpreted to them what referred to him

in all the Scriptures.

As they approached the village to which they were going,

he gave the impression that he was going on farther.

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12C continued...

But they urged him, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening and the day is almost over."

So he went in to stay with them.

And it happened that, while he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing,

broke it, and gave it to them.

With that their eyes were opened and they recognized him.
but he vanished from their sight.

Then they said to each other,

"Were not our hearts burning within us while he spoke to us on the way and opened the Scriptures to us?"

So they set out at once and returned to Jerusalem where they found gathered together the Eleven and those with them who were saying, "The Lord has truly been raised and has appeared to Simon!"

Then the two recounted what had taken place on the way and how he was made known to them in the breaking of the bread.

13C <u>Luke 24: 1-16</u>

At daybreak on the first day of the week the women who had come from Galilee with Jesus took spices they had prepared and went to the tomb.

They found the stone rolled away from the tomb;

but when they entered,

they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus.

While they were puzzling over this, behold,

two men in dazzling garments appeared to them.

They were terrified and bowed their faces to the ground.

They said to them,

"Why do you seek the living one among the dead?" He is not here, but he has been raised.

Remember what he said to you while he was

still in Galilee,

that the Son of Man must be handed over to sinners and be crucified, and rise on the third day."

And they remembered his words.

Then they returned to the tomb

and announced all these things to the eleven and to all the others.

The women were Mary Magdalene, Joanna, and Mary the mother of James; the others who accompanied them also told this to the apostles, but their story seemed like nonsense and they did not believe them.

But Peter got up and ran to the tomb,

bent down, and saw the burial cloths alone; then he went home amazed at what had happened.

Two of the disciples of Jesus were going

to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were conversing about all the things that had occurred.

And it happened that while they were conversing and debating,

Jesus himself drew near and walked with them, but their eyes were prevented from recognizing him.

14C John 3: 13-17

Jesus said to Nicodemus:

"No one has gone up to heaven
except the one who has come down
from heaven, the Son of Man.

And just as Moses lifted up the serpent
in the desert,
so must the Son of Man be lifted up,
so that everyone who believes in him

may have eternal life."

For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life.

For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him.

15C John 6: 37-40

Jesus said to the crowds:

"Everything that the Father gives me will come to me.

and I will not reject anyone who comes to me,

because I come down from heaven not to do my own will

but the will of the one who sent me.

And this is the will of the one who sent me,

that I should not lose anything of what he gave me,

but that I should raise it on the last day.

For this is the will of my Father,

that everyone who sees the Son

and believes in him

may have eternal life,

and I shall raise him on the last day."

16C John 10: 27-30

Jesus said:

"My sheep hear my voice;

I know them, and they follow me.

I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish.

No one can take them out of my hand.

My father, who has given them to me, is greater than all,

and no one can take them out of the Father's hand.

The Father and I are one."

17C John 6: 51-59

Jesus said to the crowds:

"I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will live forever; and the bread that I will give is my Flesh for the life of the world."

The Jews quarreled among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his Flesh to eat?" Jesus said to them,

"Amen, amen, I say to you, unless you eat the Flesh of the Son of Man and drink his Blood, you do not have life within you.

Whoever eats my Flesh and drinks my Blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day.

For my Flesh is true food, and my Blood is true drink.

Whoever eats my Flesh and drinks my Blood remains in me and I in him.

Just as the living Father sent me and I have life because of the Father, so also the one who feeds on me will have life because of me.

This is the bread that came down from heaven. Unlike your ancestors who ate and still died, whoever eats this bread will live forever."

18C John 10: 11-18

Jesus said:

"I am the good shepherd.

A good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep.

A hired man, who is not a shepherd

and whose sheep are not his own,

sees a wolf coming and leaves the sheep

and runs away,

and the wolf catches and scatters them.

This is because he works for pay and has no concern for the sheep.

I am the good shepherd,

and I know mine and mine know me,

just as the Father knows me and I know the Father;

and I will lay down my life for the sheep.

I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold.

These also I must lead, and they will hear my voice,

and there will be one flock, one shepherd.

This is why the Father loves me,

because I lay down my life in order to take it up again.

No one takes it from me, but I lay it down on my own.

I have power to lay it down, and power to take it up again.

This command I have received from my Father."

19C John 11: 17-27

When Jesus arrived in Bethany, he found

that Lazarus had already been in the tomb for four days.

Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, only about

two miles away.

Many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary

To comfort them about their brother.

When Martha heard that Jesus was coming,

she went to meet him;

but Mary sat at home

Martha said to Jesus,

"Lord, if you had been here,

my brother would not have died.

But even now I know that whatever you ask of God,

God will give you."

Jesus said to her,

"your brother will rise."

Martha said to him,

"I know he will rise,

in the resurrection on the last day."

Jesus told her,

"I am the resurrection and the life;

whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live,

and everyone who believes in me will never die.

Do you believe this?"

She said to him, "Yes Lord.

I have come to believe that you are the Christ,

the Son of God,

the one who is coming into the world."

20C John 12:32-45

Iesus said:

"And when I am lifted up from the earth,

I will draw everyone to myself."

He said this indicating the kind of death he would die.

So the crowd answered him,

"We have heard from the law that the Messiah remains forever.

Then how can you say that the Son of Man must be lifted up? Who is this Son of Man?"

Jesus said to them,

"The light will be among you only a little while.

Walk while you have the light, so that darkness may not overcome you. Whoever walks in the dark does not know

While you have the light, believe in the light,

where he is going.

so that you may become children of the light."

After he had said this, Jesus left and hid from them.

Although he had performed so many signs

in their presence they did not believe in him, in order that the word, which Isaiah the prophet spoke might be fulfilled:

"Lord, who has believed our preaching,

to whom has the might of the Lord been revealed?"

For this reason they could not believe,

because again Isaiah said:

"He blinded their eyes and hardened their hearts, so that they might not see with their eyes and understand with their hearts and be converted, and I would heal them."

Isaiah said this because he saw his glory

and spoke about him.

Nevertheless, many, even among the authorities,

believed in him, but because of the Pharisees

They did not acknowledge it openly

in order not to be expelled from the synagogue.

For they preferred human praise to

the glory of God.

Jesus cried out and said,

"Whoever believes in me believes not only in me but also in the one who sent me, and whoever sees me sees the one who sent me."

21C John 12: 23-26

Jesus said to his disciples:

"The hour has come for the Son of Man

to be glorified.

Amen, amen, I say to you,

unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies,

it remains just a grain of wheat;

but if it dies, it produces much fruit.

Whoever loves his life loses it,

and whoever hates his life in this world

will preserve it for eternal life.

Whoever serves me must follow me,

and where I am, there also will my servant be.

The Father will honor whoever serves me."

22C John 14: 1-6

Jesus said to his disciples:

"Do not let your hearts be troubled.

You have faith in God; have faith also in me.

In my Father's house there are many

dwelling places.

If there were not,

Would I have told you that I am going

to prepare a place for you?

And if I go and prepare a place for you,

I will come back again and take you to myself,

so that where I am you also may be.

Where I am going you know the way,"

Thomas said to him,

"Master, we do not know where you are going;

how can we know the way?"

GENERAL INTERCESSIONS

The petitions allow us to personalize our needs in prayer. Family members and friends may wish to write these prayers so that they are more appropriate. The petitions which follow may be used as written or as a guide in composing personal petitions.

Priest: (Begins the general intercessions with a prayer)

Leader: Our brother/sister, N. (N. is used to indicate the person's name), was given the promise of eternal life in baptism: Lord give him/her joy in the company of all the saints. We pray to the Lord...

Response of congregation after each petition: Lord hear our Prayer

Leader: N. ate the Bread of eternal life, the Body of Christ; raise him/her up on the last day. We pray to the Lord...

Leader: We pray for all who have been close to us, for all who have been good to us, Lord, give them the reward of their goodness. **We pray to the Lord...**

Leader: We pray for all who have died in the hope of rising again; welcome them and all the deceased members of our family especially N., into the light of your presence, Lord. **We pray to the Lord...**

Leader: We pray for all who have gathered here to worship in faith; Lord, make us one in your kingdom. **We pray to the Lord...**

Leader: We pray for our family that we may be given strength, courage, and comfort in these difficult times. **We pray to the Lord...**

Priest: (Ends the general intercession with a prayer. It generally concludes with these words "**We ask this through Christ our Lord.**")
